If ever there were a time for a candle in the darkness, this would be it. Using a spark of hope, kindle the flame of love, ignite the light of peace, and feed the flame of justice.

Land Acknowledgement In countries such as New Zealand, Australia, and Canada, and among tribal nations in the U.S., it is commonplace, even policy, to open events and gatherings by acknowledging the traditional indigenous inhabitants of that land. Acknowledgment is a critical public intervention, a necessary step toward honoring Native communities and enacting the much larger project of decolonization and reconciliation. We offer this acknowledgement, building upon text offered by Luther professors Holly Moore, Anna Peterson, and David Faldet, as well as by the U.S. Department of Arts and Culture in partnership with indigenous peoples. We acknowledge that northeast Iowa was home to

- the Ioway, whose traditional name is Baxoje;
- the Sac and Fox--the Fox's traditional name is Meskwaki;
- the Dakota;
- and the Ho-Chunk (sometimes called Winnebago, though the origin of this name is derogatory, meaning people of the "dirty water");

peoples whose relationship to this land continues today. We acknowledge our sad history of broken treaties and the forced migration of indigenous peoples. We are grateful for the way this land supports and sustains our lives and thus also express our appreciation for the stewardship of this land by its prior inhabitants: indigenous, migrant, and immigrant. May the values of reciprocity and truth-telling still so vital to indigenous culture inspire us as we seek a path of peace and justice in our lives together. I invite you to take a moment for reflection upon the many legacies of violence, displacement, migration, and settlement that have shaped our presence here today and to adopt an attitude of reverence and gratitude for the ongoing resilience of this place and the people who have called it home.
